A. Overview of the Criminal Justice Department

1. Mission and Structure

The Department of Criminal Justice is dedicated to providing a dynamic educational experience that integrates theory and practice. The faculty attempt to strike the proper balance between the acquisition of knowledge and the application and utilization of that knowledge.

The curriculum focuses on the study of the criminal justice system and its component parts: law enforcement, courts, corrections, and juvenile justice. The Department's curriculum attempts to accomplish two major goals. First, it is designed to provide students with a liberal arts education that focuses upon basic skills such as the ability to read critically, to write clearly, to speak effectively, and to think analytically. Second, the criminal justice concentration of specialized course-work serves as the foundation for a career in a criminal justice profession.

Readings, lectures, and research assignments are supplemented with field trips and with guest speakers who are recognized professionals in the field. These efforts are enhanced by a demanding, yet rewarding, internship program. The Department offers Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees in criminal justice and continues to work on establishing a doctoral (Ph.D.) program in criminal justice.

The Department's research activities further exemplify the commitment to integrating theory and practice of our interdisciplinary field. Some of that research addresses specific needs of criminal justice agencies, while some is more theoretical in nature. Further proof of the Department's commitment to scholarship can be found in two respected peer-reviewed journals published in the Department: *Criminal Justice Review* and the *International Criminal Justice Review*; also, one of our faculty members serves as the editor of *Police Forum*. Another dimension of the Department's research activity is the Statistical Analysis Bureau (SAB) which analyzes Georgia criminal justice data. The Department also the Georgia International Law Enforcement Exchange Program (GILEE) for law enforcement executive development in Georgia and several other countries, and the International Law Enforcement Enterprise (ILEE); several faculty members regularly engage in international research and assistance projects.

The Department maintains close professional ties with the criminal justice community through a host of agency-based internship placements, through various public committees and projects, and at various public events.

2. Students

Current students and graduates of the program are found in all components of the criminal and juvenile justice systems and at all professional levels within these components at the metro, state, and national levels. The Department values the close relationships that are maintained among students, faculty, and alumni. This mutual support provides a dynamic environment which is enhanced even more by the proximity of municipal, county, state, and federal agencies as well as the private security sector.

Student enrollment declined for the second consecutive time in the last ten years. The Department had a total of 821 students enrolled during 2000 (a 7% decline over 1999) of whom 53.8% were minorities (an increase of 1.2 percentage points over 1999) and 65.6% were female (an increase of 3.0 percentage points over 1999) - an all time high. A total of 4,880 credit hours were produced by the faculty of which 65.1% were weighted credit hours produced by the full-time faculty (an increase of 9.8 percentage points over 1999) and the rest by part-time instructors. Weighted credit hours and weighted contact hours are the same for the department as all courses meet for the same number of hours for which credit is provided (with the exception of the internship requirement). The Department produced 19.9% of the total number of credit hours produced by the College of Health and Human Sciences (a decrease of 5 percentage points over 1999, returning to the 1998 level). The Department had a total of 55 requests for courses that were not met - a decrease of 35.9% over 1999 (unmet demand = student request denied because the course was full). The following three tables provide a summary of the departmental student enrollment, credit hour (and weighted credit hour) production, and unmet demand.

The Department placed a total of 67 criminal justice majors in internships with a variety of criminal justice agencies, generating 230 credit hours (4.7% of the total departmental credit hour production; a decline of 1.3 percentage points over 1999). Students may enroll in the internship section (CRJU- 4940) for 3 to 6 credit hours. The Department has more than 100 agencies it utilizes for internship purposes. The following is the breakdown by semester and credit hour production of student internship placements for 2000:

B. Highlights of 2000

1. Special Accomplishments by Department, Programs, and Projects

- Faculty published a total of one book, five book chapters, six refereed articles, ten non-refereed articles, one encyclopedia entry; and made 31 professional presentations.
- Faculty received four extramural grants and seven intramural grants and issued five research reports.
- Faculty participated in several international activities: Attended a Conference on Policing in Central and Eastern Europe; Advised the Research and Development Committee, Modern Women's Foundation, Taipei, Taiwan, R.O.C.; Presented advances in community policing to the Hungarian National Police, the Israel National Police, and the Brussels 2000: International Conference on Evaluating Community Policing, Free University of Brussels; Participated in a Council on International Educational Exchange (CIEE) program in South Africa; Participated in the Xth International Symposium on Victimology in Montreal, Canada; Participated in the 14th Conference of the International Society for the Reform of Criminal Law in Sandton, South Africa; Hosted four delegations of law enforcement executives from and in Georgia, Israel, and Utah.
- The 15th annual Phil Peters Race was held at the GBI complex in Decatur in April, 2000. The race proceeds have been added to the Phil Peters Scholarship endowment fund which now exceeds \$198,000. This was the last year for this race.
- Dr. Volkan Topalli of Tulane University and Dr. Sue Collins of Florida State University were hired as assistant professors as a result of a proactive national search.
- Faculty were quoted extensively in a variety of public media outlets.
- The Department made progress towards the establishment of its Ph.D. program.
- The Department awarded one Presidential Assistantship to Jason Williams.
- Faculty and Students established the Criminal Justice Student Association (CJSA).

3. Special Activities in Instruction, Research, and Public Service

Departmental Journals:

Criminal Justice Review. One issue of *CJR* (Volume 24, Number 1), which contained 1 article, 1 research note, 1 comment piece, 1 summary of recent legal developments, and 30 book reviews.

International Criminal Justice Review. No issues of *ICJR* were published.

Professional Research and Service Programs:

Statistical Analysis Bureau (SAB)

The SAB's director was invited to become a partner in the Greater Atlanta Data Center (housed at the Burruss Institute at Kennesaw State University). Together with the Department of Geography, GSU's role will be to map and analyze metropolitan crime data.

The Georgia International Law Enforcement Exchange Program (GILEE)

GILEE sent one delegation of 16 chiefs and sheriffs, two corporate executives from Georgia, and four chiefs from Utah to Israel (June). In addition, GILEE carried out three smaller projects in Georgia that included nine participants. Since GILEE's establishment in 1992, the activities this year brought the total number of law enforcement executives graduating from the program to 215 and the total number of projects to 47. For 2001, GILEE is planning to host one delegation from Israel in Georgia and send one delegation from Georgia to Israel. GILEE continues to receive financial support from individuals and corporations.

The International Law Enforcement Enterprise (ILEE)

ILEE hosted an international briefing at GSU with panelists Dale Watson, Assistant FBI Director and Brigadier General David Tsur, Chief of Staff of Israel's Ministry of Public Security. Approximately 200 law enforcement leaders at the federal, state, and local level were in attendance.

C. Affirmative Action/Equal Opportunity

Given the highly satisfying student profile of our department no special efforts were made at recruiting minority/female students. In faculty searches, the Department made a strong effort to identify, contact, and recruit promising faculty who are also minorities and/or females. The Department hired two faculty members (one black female and one white male) at the assistant professor level. Our recruitment efforts continued to serve as a role model to the college and the university. The GSU Office of Affirmative Action gave high praise for the thoroughness and effectiveness of our hiring approach.

D. Strategic Planning

Planning priorities

1. Establishment of a doctoral program (Ph.D.) in criminal justice.
2. Fill two faculty vacancies at assistant professor level (one new position and the position vacated by the retirement of Dr. James Maddex).
3. Complete the Departmental Academic Program Review Self-Study.

Goals achieved

1. The Departmental Ph.D. Planning Committee continued to make progress.
2. Dr. Volkan Topalli and Dr. Sue Collins were hired as assistant professors. Dr. Topalli's appointment began in the fall of 2000; Dr. Collins' search was completed in December 2000 and her appointment will be effective in 2001.
3. The Departmental Academic Program Review Self Study continued to make progress. Work is to be completed in the second half of 2001.

1. Complete revision of M.S. program.
2. Submit the Ph.D. proposal for college and university review.
3. Hire one administrative assistant.
4. Obtain necessary office space for faculty and staff.
