Courses Developed

SOC439G: Special Topics in Crime and Delinquency: Communities and Crime (University of Kentucky) This special topics course was developed to allow students interested in criminology to further explore some of the important emerging issues in the relationships between community structure and crime rates. The course begins with a brief introduction to structural effects, grounding students in the sociological significance of studying aggregates and helping to clarify how it is that communities can have effects, separate from and superordinate to the individuals which make-up those communities. The course then progresses to examine a variety of criminological theories and

empirical research that address the relationship between communities and crime.

SOC439G: Special Topics in Crime and Delinquency: Researching Issues in Criminology (University of Kentucky) This course was designed to allow students to develop a greater understanding of information presented in the introductory criminology course by giving them actual experience researching criminological questions. The course provides "hands on" computer driven research experience, using real data, to learn more about theoretical and methodological issues in the field of criminology. The course requires students to complete 10 in class assignments and 10 homework assignments in which they read research articles develop related hypotheses and test them using both micro and macro level data sets.

SOC730: Special Topics in Deviant Behavior: Macro sociological Approaches to Crime and Crime Control (University of Kentucky) The course is an introduction to Macro sociological approaches to both crime causation and crime control. As such it searches for the explanations of crime and crime control in the social, economic and political contexts of societies and communities. During the course students read a wide variety of both theoretical and empirical literature exploring Macro sociological approaches to issues in criminology. Students are required to write either an extensive literature review or a research proposal on some topic covered in the course.

SOC682: Special Topics in Advanced Sociological Methods: Survey Research (University of Kentucky) This course was developed in consultation with the Methods Committee and became required Methods course for doctoral students in sociology. The course examines the social survey as a method for collecting information and addressing research questions. The course provides students with the fundamental skills for critiquing, constructing and carrying out a survey. During the course students are required to take two examinations and write six assignments, one of which requires them to develop an actual survey instrument.

CRJ890: Special Topics: The Community Context of Crime and Crime Control (Eastern Kentucky University) This course examines the ways in which, and the extent to which, community structure and culture affect the likelihood of crime occurring, the measurement of crime, and crime control activities. During this course students critically examine and synthesize the developing body of literature in this area. Additionally, the course focuses on transformative thinking, encouraging students to develop new ideas regarding community level causes of crime and innovative ways that communities can address crime problems.
